A HISTORY OF HELPING. A FUTURE OF IMPACT.

> Life Science Cares was founded in Boston in 2016 and has since grown to serve several key regions throughout the United States. In 2021, Life Science Cares Bay Area (LSC-BA) launched with a \$1M philanthropic investment from JP Morgan to activate the people, power, and financial capital of the life sciences industry.

In less than two years, Life Science Cares Bay Area has granted nearly \$2M to 18 deserving nonprofits throughout our beautiful Bay Area.

We envision all of our neighbors having access to basic needs, access to education, and access to opportunity.


WORDS FROM FOUNDING BOARD MEMBERS OF LIFE SCIENCE CARES BAY AREA

A WORD FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, AISHA BARO





ALAS

Rolling forward with the Farmworker Equity Express

A new program developed in partnership with Life Science Cares Bay Area and ALAS (Ayudando Latinos a Soñar) is bridging the equity gap faced by farmworkers along the coast. Launching this fall with a retrofitted double-decker bus, the Farmworker Equity Express will provide virtual connections to healthcare providers, mental health services, and online tutoring, plus facilitate online adult classes through local community colleges. The internet-and computer-equipped bus will visit several farms in the Half Moon Bay area, ensuring that workers can connect to desperately needed resources.

ALAS is a nonprofit organization that advocates for farmworkers and the Latino community. During the past two years, ALAS had a clear view of the disparities in access to basic programs by the agricultural worker population, who often live and work long hours in remote areas of the Coastside. The ongoing pandemic highlighted extreme disparities in health equity, evident in disproportionate incidence and mortality of COVID-19 among essential workers in general, and farmworkers in particular. With the partnership between ALAS and LSC-BA, we believe we'll be able to help improve the lives of many of our agricultural workers.

GLIDE

Support for those most in need

GLIDE is a nationally recognized center for social justice, dedicated to fighting systemic injustices, creating pathways out of poverty and crisis, and transforming lives. Through its comprehensive and integrated services, advocacy initiatives, and inclusive community, GLIDE empowers individuals, families, and children to stabilize their lives and thrive.

On the forefront of addressing some of society's most pressing issues, GLIDE works toward ending poverty and homelessness, and promoting racial and social justice. In addition to providing financial support, LSC-BA coordinated a dozen corporate partner volunteer events benefiting GLIDE's programs. Hundreds of volunteers prepared Thanksgiving meals, stuffed COVID vaccine goodie bags, assembled women's hygiene care packages, and contributed to a toy drive—providing needed supplies and happier holidays for many in need.

Project Onramp

Opening doors through internship and education

The life sciences industry in the Bay Area is poised to create opportunities for populations from underrepresented communities, helping to bridge the opportunity gap for many promising students. Additionally, the life sciences industry can benefit from a workforce that reflects the patients it serves. While many companies offer valuable internship opportunities, it can be difficult for students from these populations to gain access to internships, which are often paths to full-time employment.

To that end, Project Onramp joined forces with leading life sciences organizations from all over the Bay Area—connecting passionate, high-achieving, four-year college students with paid internships of up to 12 weeks. Our first-year goal was to place 15 students in paid internships. We exceeded that goal and placed 25.

EDUCATION: Case Study



Girls Crushing It

Building confidence and opportunity

It began with the art of folded paper. After starting an origami business at school and quickly saturating the market, Christophe and Sophie Davis pitched the idea of selling their products at the local farmers' market to their mother, Roxanne (soon to become their business partner). The experience sparked a spirit of entrepreneurship in the girls—and it was empowering. It enabled them to earn their own money and donate a portion to the World Wildlife Fund.

Inspired to create space for girls to build confidence through entrepreneurship, Roxanne founded the Girls Crushing It (GCI) nonprofit in 2018. In 2020, GCI partnered with the Nasdaq Entrepreneurial Center to deliver virtual programming to girls around the world. Since its incorporation, GCI has educated thousands of girls in entrepreneurship, and their alumnae have delivered pitches and sold products to more than 10,000 people at their signature pop-up shops throughout the Bay Area. Perhaps the most exciting part of it all is that 97% of alumnae report increased confidence as a result of their endeavors.

Breakthrough SF

Breaking through barriers with education

Breakthrough SF believes that all young people should have access to an excellent education, a clear path to college, and highly effective teachers committed to their success. In pursuit of this vision, Breakthrough SF provides intensive, year-round academic enrichment and support to motivated fifth-through 12th-graders who would otherwise have limited educational opportunities, with an end goal of helping them attend college.

In addition, the organization trains outstanding college students from across the country for careers in education. It also helps students develop instructional skills and build knowledge and pathways to teaching, and inspires them to cultivate a career in the field.

An initiative of San Francisco Day School, Breakthrough SF is a K-8 independent school that values academic excellence for all students, whether in public or private schools. It is one of two dozen national affiliates of the Oakland-based organization Breakthrough Collaborative.

Upward Scholars


Carving a path from adult school to community college

Immigrants and first-generation Americans have always been an integral part of California's story and success. Our state is vibrant, diverse, and innovative because of their hard work and ingenuity. That is why Upward Scholars' mission is to provide adult immigrants the boost they need to move up the economic ladder through education and career development support.

While some immigrants arrive with education and economic privilege, the vast majority do not. Many have no choice but to work multiple low-wage jobs, putting their educational and career aspirations aside to survive and support their families. Without access to formal education and the ability to master English, many opportunities are not accessible.

Upward Scholars is the only nonprofit in the Bay Area providing financial, academic, and career development support to adults struggling with economic hardship. The program is designed to help individuals transition from adult schools to community colleges (usually part time). As a result of the organization's work, students continue their education, get higher-paying jobs, serve as role models, and become advocates for their children and our community.
